Missions Moment—Torchbearers

Dear Little White Church,

As the holiday season quickly approaches, this fall remains without a Fraser, Colorado staple: SNOW! Our community of ski tourism relies heavily on the consistency of our annual snowfall, and yet here we are, nearing the end of November with only a dusting of snow on the ground and the mountains. The town remains quiet and empty as 'mud' season drags on and we collectively wait for the moisture that sustains the livelihoods of families and business in our area.

Meanwhile, life at Timberline has not been slow! We've been getting to know 41 students from the US, Canada, and Europe over the past 2 1/2 months, and the Bible school program is in full swing. So far the students have studied the books of Colossians, the Torah, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, 1 Kings, 2 Timothy, Jeremiah, and Ecclesiastes, along with series on the Gospel & Evangelism, Biblical Worldview, the Upper Room in John, and the 10 Commandments. Each week a lecturer will teach through one book or series to the students. Some lecturers are on staff here at Timberline, while many fly in from around the country and work as pastors, professors, or staff at other Torchbearers centers. Guests can come stay at Timberline for a week during the Bible School program and sit under a week of Bible teaching - please know that is an option for you or your family!

Currently, students are preparing for their first semester mission trip, which will take place in New York City in early December. Timberline partners with several ministries in New York that we have built connections with over the years, and the students will be divided in groups throughout the city working in homeless shelters, jails, churches, and other street ministries. New York will be the first time many students will share their testimony or a devotional publicly, and it's exciting to walk through their preparations with them.

As for our family, we continue to see God at work in, though, and around us. Andrew is in his second year serving as an elder in our local church, which has been growing exponentially and is facing the beautiful challenge of running out of room for the people! Lisa has been meeting with 3 younger staff women for intentional mentoring and discipleship, and has been blessed to see spiritual fruit come from their times together. Isaiah, Ezra, and Judah all had a tougher transition than usual into school due to changes in teachers, friends, and class dynamics, but God has faithfully been meeting each of them in their struggles.

Each day, there are many opportunities to share Christ: with each other, with our children, with the students and staff, with friends and acquaintances in town, and in the interactions we have with strangers. More than ever, we see our need to abide in Christ and depend on Him for each part of our day, our job, and our lives.

And so, as we feel this need so strongly ourselves, may we encourage you to turn your face towards Jesus today? Let Him be the source of your strength, your joy, and your love - Christ has given Himself fully to us and we cannot live this Christian life apart from Him!

Keeping the Family Strong

A PERFECT DESIGN

I confess: one of my favorite things about this time of year is the food. Some of my favorite foods end up on the menu for Thanksgiving or Christmas! As I ponder that fact, I'm also aware of how very blessed I am. May I remember that fact with every mouthful.

Have you ever really thought about eating? About *HOW* we take in nourishment? If you do, you'll discover what I have . . . the process itself is a miracle.

All of God's creatures — Sealife, birds, animals — have some orifice through which they take in nourishment. Some are able to pick up their food with their feet and lift it **to** their mouths. Many must bend over and pick up the food **with** their mouths.

Humans were designed a little more intricately. Our hands can *prepare* the food we eat. Then, we use them to lift the food to our mouths. From there, it is moved through our body's digestive system. I know: it's all part of the design, and all creatures digest their food. It's just the way it all works. Still, I find it fascinating.

Then, I got to thinking about the world of plants. Raising my kids in rural Pennsylvania, I had the chance to learn some intriguing things about plants. About the way THEY take in nourishment. More than any other creature, plants are at the mercy of nature's whims.

If it's too hot, they dry up and die. If it's too cold, they freeze to death. Torrential rains can drown them. Ice can break their branches. Strong winds can uproot them or tear them down. It takes a perfect balance of sun, rain, and support from the soil-borne nutrients for a plant to flourish.

Then, there's the *method* of how they take in that nourishment. If it falls on them, in the form of moisture, it is absorbed by their leaves and transferred to their roots. If it's *in* the ground, the roots absorb it directly, and transfer it to the rest of the plant.

No hands, with which to pick it up. No mouth, through which to consume it. A very complex design makes sure they receive the nourishment they need. For a tree, that design includes a thin layer that transports nutrients up and down the height of the tree. I once learned just how complex that design is, after a Spring rain.

It was early enough in Spring that the trees were at that stage of waking up where you could see all the buds where leaves would soon develop. On this particular day, I decided to go for a walk after the rain stopped. I wanted to enjoy the fresh aroma of rain-soaked plants and air. Plus, I've always loved the way raindrops hang like diamonds on the tree branches!

Walking along, I became curious about those dangling water droplets. I wondered if there was any rhyme or reason to **where** they clung to the tree. As I stepped in, to take a closer look, I made the most amazing discovery. On **each** tree I examined . . . on **every** branch, the sparkling drops of water followed a very **specific** pattern. Realizing what I was seeing left me standing in awestruck wonder, unable to move. I was totally captivated by the sheer perfection of it all . . .

You see, **each place** where a drop of water was clinging to a tree branch was a place where a **leaf-bud** was waiting to open up! As though the tree had reached out and grabbed the water, and then held it close to the **one** place that could transfer the precious moisture throughout the tree's intricate digestive system.

In the book of Matthew, in chapter six, we are told not to worry about how our needs will be provided for. We're told to consider how God cares for the birds, the plants, and all of Creation. As I remembered the wondrous thing I had once learned about the trees, that passage of Scripture made more sense than ever before.

Whether we're considering the nutritional needs of plants, or how animals and birds take in nourishment . . . or pondering how *our* bodies use the food we eat . . . there is absolutely NO question in my mind *Who* is responsible for such a perfect design.

As you gather with your loved ones, to celebrate this magnificent season of wonder, I urge you to take the time to **notice** — and **acknowledge** — all of the amazing blessings which God has bestowed upon your life. They're there, I promise. Take time to **LOOK** for them!

This article is in response to Leslie Hladysz's opinion piece in the Prevailer two weeks ago. She feels that the invocation given before city council meetings goes against the separation of church and state. I intend this not only to enlighten her on our history but as information for our church family.

In response to her opinion may I offer mine? I only wish to point out that our nations history is undeniably tied to religion and God. Hill City is part of this nation is it not? God is central to many of our lives; so was and is He central to our government and it's foundations. There is no attack more destructive or dishonest than the attempt to write God out of American history. Even though it failed, the activist courts tried to remove Under God from our pledge of allegiance and declare it unconstitutional. Even if taken literally, the phrase is merely descriptive and only identifies the U.S. as a nation subject to divine authority. The Supreme Court itself begins each day by proclaiming, "God save the U.S. and this honorable court." Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas wrote, "We are a religious people and our institutions presuppose a Supreme Being."

For most of Americans (91%) Gods blessings are the basis of our liberty, prosperity, and survival as a unique country. For most Americans, prayer is real, we call on God for wisdom, guidance, and salvation. Our media and academic elites find religion threatening, or old fashioned and unsophisticated. Our schools have been driving the mention of God out of our history. For two generations we have accepted the judiciary's assault on our religious values even while we believe that our fundamental rights come from God and therefore are unalienable. A solid commitment to religious freedom is the cornerstone of our history. The marching song of the Union Army included this line "as Christ died to make men holy let us die to make men free." In the Declaration of Independence Thomas Jefferson wrote that all people, "are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." John Adams, Alexander Hamilton and John Dichenson, all signers of the Declaration of Independence all wrote that no man had the right to take away the rights that God gave us. Benjamin Franklin often regarded as the least religious of our Founding Fathers at age 81 wrote, "the longer I live, the more convincing proof I see of this truth is that God governs in the affairs of men." Note that our Founding Fathers did not write, "we the states, we the government nor we the lawyers and judges or we the media and academics, rather they wrote" we the people. " If schools don't teach about Lincoln, they don't have to deal with his 14 references to God and 4 Bible verses in his inaugural address. That speech is carved into a wall of the Lincoln Memorial. The ACLU, private citizens and the University of William and Mary in Virginia tried, unsuccessfully, to remove crosses from veteran memorials and campus chapels. George Washington publicly acknowledged God by placing his hand on a Bible during taking his oath of office and adding so help me God and kissing the Bible at the end of the oath. He began his Thanksgiving proclamation on October3,1789,by declaring, "It's the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, His will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore His protections and favor."

Liberty is the purpose of government, for it to survive it requires our free people to be virtuous. This requires a "true religion that is cultivated among us." At the end of Washington's inaugural address he stated, "True religion affords to government its surest support. " The following quotes are profound.

George Washington: Of all dispositions the habits which lead to political prosperity, religion and morality are indispensable supports. John Adams: We have no government armed with power capable of contending with human passions unbridled by morality and religion. Our constitution was made for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other. Sam Adams: Religion and good morals are the only solid foundation of public liberty and happiness. Alexander Hamilton: The politician who loves liberty sees a gulph that may swallow up the liberty to which he is devoted. He knows that morality overthrown and morality must fall without religion. Charles Carroll: Without morals a republic cannot subsist any length of time; they therefore, who are decrying the Christian religion undermine the duration of free governments. Elias Boudinot: Our country should be preserved from the dreadful evil of becoming enemies of the religion of the Gospel.John Adams: Religion and virtue are the only foundations of all free governments. Thomas Jefferson: The interests of society require the observation of those moral precepts in which all religions agree. Governor. Morris: Religion is the only solid base of morals that are the only possible support for free governments. Benjamin Rush: The only foundation for a useful education in a republic is to be laid in religion. Washington in his general orders wrote "the fate of unborn millions will now depend, under God, on the courage and conduct of this army."

What about our national monuments? National Archives: The Ten Commandments are engraved in bronze on the entry floor. The Bill of Rights begins: "if Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof. "This protects the freedom of religion, not freedom from religion .The Washington Monument is filled with references to our creator and references to God. The Jefferson Memorial: A Thepanel begins with these words," I have sworn upon the alter of God ".Lincolns Gettysburg address is only 700 words long and mentions God 14 times and the Bible 4 times. Reagan's words when he dedicated the Vietnam Veterans Memorial" the Lord will bless and keep you". The FDR memorial inscription states that Americans must choose the path of faith." The Capital Building is filled with religious imagery and inscriptions. The Supreme Court has the Ten Commandments prominently displayed. As you enter the! Library Congress the Gutenberg Bible is prominently displayed. In a 1983 speech Ronald Reagan said"with God's help the worlds nuclear Arsenals would be totally eliminated. Eisenhower "The real fire within the builders of America was faith... faith in the providence of God.

"Our rights that come from God are the surest foundation of our liberty and freedom."-Newt Gingrich .




